Healthy Me

Classes 2, 3 and 4 have been set a challenge from the North Lincolnshire School's sports network. Each class has to collect **healthy food packaging** to put in a bin in their class. The lady will return during our 'Healthy Lifestyle Week' at the end of July to see which class has collected the most. The children were all given a card to explain the details, but in case of any misplaced cards: Look at the food label; we are looking at **fats** and **of which sugars** in the **per 100g** column. The **fat** has to be 3g or less and the **of which sugars** has to be 5g or less. They both have to be under these amounts to count! Fruit can be counted even though the sugars is higher as it is natural sugar. Good luck with your healthy challenge. We look forward to filling our packaging bins!



Class 1

Once again, we have had a very busy and exciting week here in Foundation, we are all definitely ready for a break now!

In phonics, we started to look at polysyllabic words and how to break them into chunks to make them easier to read and spell (e.g. chimpanzee – chim-pan-zee) and we clapped the words out before trying to spell them. We continue to revise the phase 3 graphemes.

In literacy, we have written out the story of 'Supertato' and we have changed one of our characters (either the hero or villain) within our stories. The children all did very well with their writing and were able to use their phonics to sound out the words they needed to write, as well as spelling some of their tricky words correctly. We are so impressed and proud, we have put them all up on the wall in our classroom.

As part of our work on healthy eating, the children designed and then made their own sandwiches which they tasted. Some of them decided to change the fillings they had planned to put in and were able to give reasons as to why they chose to do this. The weather was so fantastic, the remaining half of the sandwich was eaten outside in the afternoon as a picnic which the children really enjoyed.

The mud kitchen has been open for business and the children have had a wonderful time making a variety of mud pies and pancakes!! There has also been a lot of interest surrounding dinosaurs and volcanoes erupting so we will be following this interest after half term.

Race over the Rainbow finishes on Friday the 26th of May, there were many children who managed to get over the rainbow this half term so a BIG well done to you! Prizes to be given on Friday! We will be back with a new reading competition after half term so keep your eyes peeled for more information on that.

Class 2



What a busy last week of this half term. The children have finished their work on Nelson Mandela and were intrigued by his life. We learned it would have been his 100th birthday next year, so wonder if there will be any celebrations. Whilst we have this fantastic weather we have made the most of it for many lessons. With a playground full of numbers the children had to solve their problems and find the answer on the ground. We have completed some PSHE regarding water poverty in Africa and watched a clip of a 3 year old child helping his mum carry water from a well, home. It took them 2 hours, so we recreated the idea in the playground. We didn't put water on our heads (though it may have been quite refreshing to get wet this week!). We used our sports cones and bean bags and walked around the grounds for 10 minutes. The children thought it would be easy, but after 2 minutes many were complaining their arms hurt holding the cone! The children also realized how lucky they are to have toilets with running water at school and didn't fancy going out in the playground when everyone was playing! With the holidays approaching we have recapped stranger danger. Mrs Britcliffe and I were very proud of Class 2's performance in our arts assembly, singing 'Amani Utpe' and showing their Kenyan tribal necklaces. I would also like to say how proud we have been of our Year 2 children who have completed several quizzes during this half term. They have completed them without any fuss and we will have a look back at the papers after half term. As a treat we have finished the week with some cooking.



Class 3



This week in Class 3 we spent a lot of time preparing for both our Arts and Roman assembly!

In our history lessons we have been learning about the rebellion of Boudicca and have been role playing as different Roman and Celt characters, thinking about how they would feel leading up to and after the battle of Watling Street.

In our Geography lessons we have been looking at sketch mapping and have used our own knowledge and google maps to draw planned maps of the local area, complete with keys.


In Maths we have been using the internet to research a specific European country to support our next piece of Geography work, looking at the rainfall and minimum and maximum temperatures in that country and how that data is represented, then having a go at creating our own graphs and tables to represent this data.

In Science we have been looking at classifying given rocks based on the observable properties of permeability, durability, hardness and density. We decided on our own methods and were able to identify and group a range of sedimentary and igneous rock samples accordingly.

Most excitingly, we performed our Roman assembly to the rest of the school and parents who were able to make it, we gave readings of different extracts from our recounts from last week, gave descriptions of the Roman Gods we have been learning about and showed off some of our Roman infantry formations: wedge, porcupine, square and testudo. Thank you to all those who came to see us on both Wednesday and Thursday.




Class 4

Garden News

This week in Gardening Club began with a tour of the beds to see what had been happening and the children made several exciting discoveries:

- In the circular bed the King Edward potato foliage was beginning to appear and there were small clumps of dark green leaves dotted all over the soil;
- In the long bed five runner bean plants had put in an appearance behind the other set of potatoes;
- Whilst in front of the potatoes in the long bed, 2 pumpkin seedlings had emerged; and
- Cucumber seedlings had appeared in 4 of the 5 pots in the poly tunnel.

Next job was to sow some dwarf French beans in the octagonal bed. Each of the children placed a bamboo cane about 4 inches in from the edge of the bed, before sowing 2 seeds at the base of each cane. Seed sowing completed, we moved around to the Foundation area and made short work of clearing the weeds out of the planters in their play space. As usual all the children worked without complaint and by the time we had finished, the planters were looking tidy and ready for new plants. With the sun beating down on us and some of the younger gardeners flagging, we sought refuge in Class 2 and discussed ecology and designs for Bug Hotels and Hedgehog houses.
